

Fasano


Rio de Janeiro, Brazil

This old Portuguese mansion in the quiet village of Majorda is Goa gone glam. Book the Konnagar Suite - it has enough room to swing 10 cats in and a verandah for watching village life go by. Or for something pretty and girlie, go for Ooty: white and airy with a great smashed-mirror mosaic bathroom. The lovely thing about Vivenda is it doesn't feel like a hotel; you are staying with friends in an impeccably decorated house. Feasting takes place around a big table in the garden or the dining room and the owners, brother and sister duo Charlotte and Simon Hayward, are such good company that the air is abuzz with chatter. 





Eden Rock

St Bart's, French West Indies

Of all the hotels in St Bart's, Eden Rock is the one that causes a real scene when the hordes are in town over Christmas. First, the food is the best; it's here in the restaurant, On the Rocks, on beautiful terraces looking out over the sea, that the serious party people get dizzy on the fizzy, pimp-rolling their way round the bar like it's a Kanye West video. Secondly, the newly revamped rooms are terrific. Sure, the beach may be a wee slip of a thing compared with some of the island's wild rollers, but this space, these decks, those hot tubs! Eden Rock was already pretty irresistible but has just got a whole lot more fabulous; a legend with a real shake in her tailfeather. Website edenrockhotel.com.  ✓ four-poster bed with embroidered Indian curtains stands grandly in the centre; a moon terrace reflects the light of the full moon; and the circular bath is big enough for a harem. It's the sort of place that you desperately want to keep secret but also desperately want to share.

Wherever you stay in the north you really should visit Anjuna. The people-watching is gripping and it's easy to retreat to the calm of Siolim when you need to. Anjuna is where those legendary full-moon parties were held before there was a government crackdown. It's still peppered with ravers, hippies and curious travellers (when did they last sleep?) heading to beach shacks such as Curly's to sip cocktails and listen to trance beats. Combine a trip to Anjuna Beach with a visit to its fleamarket held every Wednesday (although the atmospheric Saturday-night market at Arpora is actually better). When you've done with gawping, go and eat - northern Goa is full of fabulous restaurants. The in-crowd flocks to La Plage at Aswem during the day. This Gallic-Mediterranean beach shack is Goa's answer to St Tropez's Club 55. Make sure you stay on the beach for the incredible sunsets. And do eat at the Thai restaurant Ku, well off the beaten track and run by Euro-hippie couple Maria and Chris. Everybody knows them and you feel as if you're walking into Alex Garland's The Beach. If you want

to sample Indian nightlife at its best, spend a night out on the tiles in Baga. The hottest places to eat an Fiesta and Le Restaurant (be sure to book – its as hard to get a table here as it is at Scott's). Kama Sis is a popular place to hang out, a kind of Indian of Ibiza's Bambuddha Grove – they mix a mean Mojito. The clubs are pretty ghastly in Goa, but are feeling brave, head to Mambo's or Tito's.
